



BEARFACTS 1990 – 2000

Slope , North Dakota [38087]

Slope is one of 53 counties in North Dakota. It is not part of a Metropolitan Area. Its 2000 population of 760 ranked 53rd in the state.

PER CAPITA PERSONAL INCOME

In 2000 Slope had a per capita personal income (PCPI) of \$25,278. This PCPI ranked 17th in the state and was 101 percent of the state average, \$25,105, and 85 percent of the national average, \$29,847. The 2000 PCPI reflected an increase of 48.6 percent from 1999. The 1999-2000 state change was 8.3 percent and the national change was 6.8 percent. In 1990 the PCPI of Slope was \$9,787 and ranked 51st in the state. The 1990-2000 average annual growth rate of PCPI was 10.0 percent. The average annual growth rate for the state was 4.6 percent and for the nation was 4.4 percent.

TOTAL PERSONAL INCOME

In 2000 Slope had a total personal income (TPI) of \$19,211*. This TPI ranked 52nd in the state and accounted for 0.1 percent of the state total. In 1990 the TPI of Slope was \$8,750* and ranked 53rd in the state. The 2000 TPI reflected an increase of 40.3 percent from 1999. The 1999-2000 state change was 7.8 percent and the national change was 8.0 percent. The 1990-2000 average annual growth rate of TPI was 8.2 percent. The average annual growth rate for the state was 4.7 percent and for the nation was 5.6 percent.

COMPONENTS OF TOTAL PERSONAL INCOME

Total personal income includes net earnings by place of residence; dividends, interest, and rent; and personal current transfer receipts received by the residents of Slope. In 2000 net earnings accounted for 65.5 percent of TPI (compared with 48.3 in 1990); dividends, interest, and rent were 22.3 percent (compared with 35.3 in 1990); and personal current transfer receipts were 12.2 percent (compared with 16.4 in 1990). From 1999 to 2000 net earnings increased 73.6 percent; dividends, interest, and rent increased 3.9 percent; and personal current transfer receipts increased 0.9 percent. From 1990 to 2000 net earnings increased on average 11.5 percent each year; dividends, interest, and rent increased on average 3.3 percent; and personal current transfer receipts increased on average 5.0 percent.

EARNINGS BY PLACE OF WORK

Earnings of persons employed in Slope increased from \$7,293* in 1999 to \$12,735* in 2000, an increase of 74.6 percent. The 1999-2000 state change was 7.2 percent and the national change was 8.0 percent. The average annual growth rate from the 1990 estimate of \$4,079* to the 2000 estimate was 12.1 percent. The average annual growth rate for the state was 5.1 percent and for the nation was 5.8 percent.
